Welcome to AP United States History!!!

Deciding to take this course demonstrates your motivation to work to an extremely high standard and to dive into the exciting topic of American History! To begin your challenging yet rewarding journey we must prepare ourselves for the school year to come.

PURPOSE OF THE SUMMER ASSIGNMENT

The Advanced Placement exam for United States History takes place during the first week of May, therefore, we need to begin our curriculum during the summer months. As an individual who may be undertaking and AP course for the first time, you must assume a great responsibility for the course material. The Summer Project allows us to get a "head start" on the first unit on the Colonial Period and to give you some experience with the type of reading, note taking, analysis and interpretation that is the backbone of the course.

SUMMER ASSIGNEMT

TASK - READ AND TAKE DETAILED NOTES

- Read the first five chapters of our text, <u>The American Pageant</u>, by Kennedy, Cohen and Bailey. These early chapters will be reviewed in class but we will move through them <u>very quickly</u>, therefore, you must have already read them in order to keep up with the rest of the class. If you did not pick the text book up at school, then you can find it online. Be sure it is the 13th Edition!
- Chapter Terms must be defined (a proper definition will explain who, what, when and why/how this person/place/event is significant to the time period being studied) THESE MUST BE HAND WRITTEN TO BE ACCEPTED!
- Answer the <u>Chapter Objective Questions for Chapters 1-5</u> (attached). A test will be given on this material in early September. THESE ANSWERS MUST BE TYPED!

Understanding Chapter Terms

Each unit will have a set of terms that are handed out as a way to guide your reading by helping you to identify the most important people, places, and events and will be collected on the day of the unit test. The AP Exam stresses critical thinking, which is more than just remembering facts and dates. It is knowing the "how" and the "why" of a particular event. However, knowing facts and dates is essential to being able to explain why certain events happened and the long lasting implications of those events. Therefore, as you read you will need to define each term on the list. Your definitions should address the who, what, when and why/how this person/place/event is important to the time period being studied. While you may work with other students on this, realize in the end ALL students are responsible for KNOWING all of the terms!

Understanding the Purpose of Chapter Objective Questions:

Throughout the year, chapter objective questions (COQs) will be given out at the beginning of the unit and will be submitted through Turnitin.com by the day of each unit test in order to be graded. The purpose of answering these questions is to make sure that you understand the important information in each chapter as you read. The answers to the questions may require information from just part of the chapter or from the entire chapter so it is to your advantage to read the entire chapter and to define the chapter terms first, and then write out the answers to the chapter objectives.

These are not complete essay questions but I do expect answers to be written in paragraph form and answers should include the use of chapter terms. Each answer should contain about 7-10 sentences (but more may be necessary). Make sure you are answering the question that is being asked and that you are addressing ALL PARTS of each question. For example, Chapter 1, question 3 asks you to "describe the developments in Europe and Africa that led up to Columbus' voyage to America." Your answer should contain several developments (not just one) such as the influence of the Crusades, the publication of Marco Polo's accounts of his journey to China, and the creation of better maps at the beginning of the Renaissance to make the unknown less fearful, etc. Make sure you address both developments in Europe AND developments in Africa!

While you may discuss these questions with other students, *this assignment must always be completed individually and in your own words*. Students found to have copied answers will receive a ZERO on the assignment with NO chance to make it up! This assignment is vital practice for your AP Exam essays – both the new shorter free-response format and the traditional essay. The information you need to answer these questions are contained entirely in your textbook, although you may use other resources as well.

THE FIRST SET (Chapters 1-5) WILL BE DUE on the FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL!

A Special Note on TIME MANAGEMENT

Time management is very important to this class, as it is NOT POSSIBLE to review all of the terms, complete the readings, the chapter objective questions, and study for a test in one evening. Work on your assignments a little each day to keep the workload manageable. I cannot stress this nearly enough – do not fall behind in the work – **time management, time management, TIME MANAGEMENT!** J

Chapter Objective Questions American Pageant Chapters 1-5 Period 1: (1491-1607) and Period 2: (1607-1754)

Chapter 1:

- Describe the geological and geographical conditions that set the stage for North American history.
- 2. Describe the origin and development of the major Indian cultures of the Americas.
- Explain the developments in Europe and Africa that led up to Columbus's voyage to America.
- 4. Explain the changes and conflict that occurred when the diverse worlds and peoples of Europe, Africa, and the Americas collided after 1492.
- Describe the Spanish conquest of Mexico and South America, and of the later Spanish colonial expansion into North America.
- Describe the major features of Spain's New World Empire, including relations with the native Indian populations.

Chapter 2: Covers Pieces of Period 1 (1491-1607) and pieces of Period 2 (1607-1754)

- Explain why England was slow to enter the colonization race and what factors finally led it to launch colonies in the early seventeenth century.
- Describe the development of the Jamestown colony from its disastrous beginnings to its later prosperity.
- Describe the cultural and social interaction and exchange between English settlers and Indians in Virginia and the effects of the Virginians' policy of warfare and forced removal on Indians and whites.
- Compare the tobacco-based economic development of Virginia and Maryland with South Carolina's reliance on large-plantation rice-growing and African slavery based on West Indian models.

5. Identify the major similarities and differences among the southern colonies of Virginia, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia.

Period 2: (1607-1754)

Chapter 3:

- Describe the Puritans and their beliefs, and explain why they left England for the New World.
- Explain how the Puritans' theology shaped the government and society of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.
- Explain how Massachusetts Bay's conflict with religious dissenters, as well as new economic opportunities, led to the expansion of New England into Rhode Island, Connecticut, and elsewhere.
- Describe the conflict between colonists and Indians in New England and the effects of King Philip's War.
- Summarize early New England attempts at inter-colonial unity and the consequences of England's Glorious Revolution in America.
- Describe the founding of New York and Pennsylvania, and explain why these two
 settlements as well as the other middle colonies became so ethnically, religiously, and politically
 diverse.
- Describe the central features of the middle colonies, and explain how they differed from New England and the southern colonies.

Chapter 4:

- Describe the basic economy, demographics, and social structure and life of the seventeenth-century colonies.
- Compare and contrast the different forms of society and ways of life of the southern colonies and New England.
- Explain how the practice of indentured servitude failed to solve the colonial labor problem and why colonists then turned to African slavery.
- Describe the character of slavery in the early English colonies and explain how a
 distinctive African American identity and culture emerged from the mingling of numerous
 African ethnic groups.
- Summarize the unique New England way of life centered on family, town, and church, and describe the problems that afflicted this comfortable social order in the late seventeenth century.
- 6. Describe family life and the roles of women in both the southern and New England colonies, and indicate how these changed over the course of the seventeenth century.

Chapter 5:

- Describe the demographic, ethnic, and social character of Britain's colonies in the eighteenth century, and indicate how colonial society had changed since the seventeenth century.
- Explain how the economic development of the colonies altered the patterns of social
 prestige and wealth, and brought growing class distinctions and class conflict to British North

- Indicate the key qualities of daily existence in eighteenth-century colonial America, including forms of socialization and recreation.
